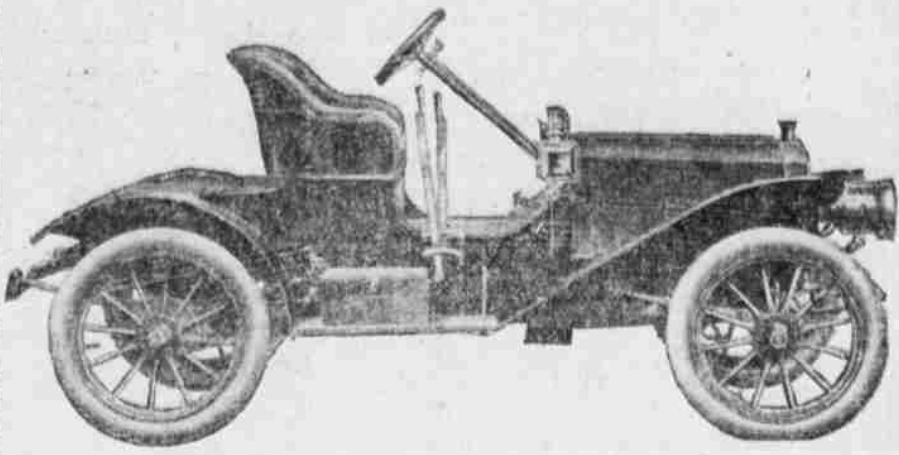

### BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

Broken Bow, Neb., Apr. 20, 1909  
Pursuant to adjournment of March 18, 1909, the County Board of Supervisors met at the Court House at 9 a. m. and was called to order by the Chairman.

The roll was then called and the following members answered present:

District No. 4—Edward Foley, Sr.  
District No. 5—J. B. Gilmore  
District No. 6—Geo. W. Headley  
District No. 7—Ben P. Morris, Chairman.

The minutes of the March 18 meeting were then read and approved.

J. E. Grint reported that he had received the sum of \$124.50, the same being for sale of old bridge lumber from the Comstock bridge, and that he had turned the treasurer's receipt for the same over to the County Clerk, less the sum of \$3.75, expenses incurred upon the same.

Ben P. Morris reported that he had received the sum of \$10.00 the same being for sale of old bridge lumber from the bridge north of Mason City, that he had turned the Treasurer's receipt for the same over to the County Clerk.

The balance of the forenoon was spent in committee work, and at 12 o'clock the Board adjourned until 1 p. m.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Board met at 1 p. m. with all members present.

The Bridge bids for 1909 were opened by the Clerk before the General Board and, upon motion, were referred to the Bridge committee for consideration.

The Board met at 8:30 a. m. with all members present.

William H. Pettit appeared before the Board and made application to be admitted to the Soldiers Home at Grand Island, and the County Clerk and Chairman of the Board were instructed to sign the necessary papers for his admittance.

The Bridge committee made the following report:

We, your committee, to whom was referred the bridge bids for 1909, as advertised, respectfully report as follows: That upon comparison of the bids as filed and opened by the Clerk, we find that the bid of Standard Bridge Company to be the lowest. Therefore, we recommend that the yearly contract for the construction of all new bridges to be built for the year 1909 be awarded to the Standard Bridge Company and that the same Company be awarded the contract for repair work as advertised.
