One Week's Instruction in Field Crops, Farm Animals and Domestic Science.

sidered in the different courses of study.

The lectures will start promptly at 10:00 o'clock each morning. Practice periods at 1:30 to 4:30 each afternoon.

Farmers living at a distance from Broken Bow should arrange their work so that they can be present on time at each session.

The Reception Committee will provide rooming and boarding places for those who come to Broken Bow to stay during the week.

In addition to the regular courses an especially attractive program has been arranged for each The program in detail will be published later.

This school is conducted under the auspices of the University of Nebraska Department of Farmers' Institutes and the Broken Bow Farmers' Institute Association.

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
