MOTHERLESS CHILDREN FOUND

Permitted Broken Bow Citizens Assist in locating the Little Ones.

Mrs. J. Sullivan of New York City received news in Broken Bow Saturday of her return from the east where she had in charge three motherless children known in Blaine County as the Thorpe children, the whereabouts of whom has been a mystery to their eastern relatives for some time.

They were brought west one at a time for the last year and a half. Each mother and step-mother, who possessed them a short time ago, leaving the little ones to shift for themselves as best they could. One Hampton, a little boy of five, was taken care of at the home of George Combs, near Tom Park, on the city flats. Maude, a little girl of seven, was found at the home of Ed and Mrs. Ed Oldham on Goose Creek, and Ernest, a boy of eleven, was at August Walter's, ten miles northwest of Elmore.

Mrs. Sullivan, the grandmother, is about sixty years of age and is a lady of education and refinement. She is of southern parentage and possesses with many families of high standing in political and educational circles in the south. One brother, George Albert Whitfield, is Chief Justice of the Supreme Bench in Mississippi. She also is a relative by marriage to U. S. Senator Bailey of Iowa.

Judge Holcomb directed the movements of Mrs. Sullivan in regard to the children and J. H. Jewett, by request of Judge Holcomb, accompanied Mrs. Sullivan in her trip to Blaine and Cherry counties. Mrs. Sullivan was enthusiastic in her opinion of the consideration shown her by the people of Blaine county in the recovery of the children.
