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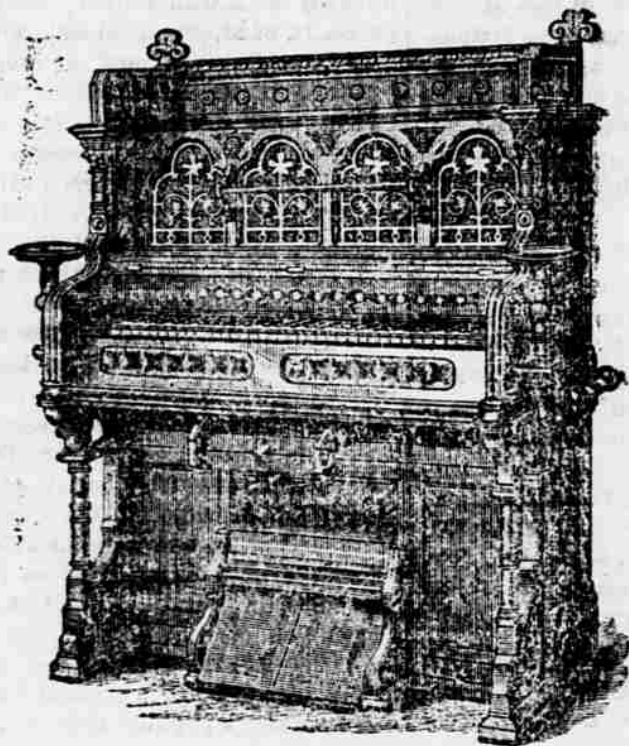

GENERAL NEWS.

A large number of workmen were killed and injured by the walls of the Wisconsin state capitol falling in, last Thursday.
