THE increase of votes at each presidential election gives some idea of the growth of our population. The whole vote east in the Harrison campaign of 1840 was a little over 2,400,000, while in 1880 it was 9,210,970, or nearly four times as great. The combined vote of clusive, with the consent of the board the New York, Pennsylvania and Indiana is now larger than the total vote of all the states in 1840; and New York alone casts nearly as many votes as were east by the whole country in 1828. Another remarkable fact is that as the votes increase the margin of difference between the parties grows narrower.
