

On the 14th of November, 1848, Daniel Webster delivered an address in the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, on the death of Chief Justice Mason. The following beautiful and impressive passages are among the closing address: "But, sir, political eminence and professional fame fade away and die with things earthly. Nothing of character is really permanent but virtue and personal worth. These remain. Whatever of excellence is wrought in the soul itself belongs to both worlds. Real goodness does not attach itself merely to this life; it points to another world. Political or professional reputation can not last forever; but a conscience void of offense before God and man is an inheritance for eternity. Religion, therefore, is an indispensable element in any great man's character. There is no living without—Religion is the tie that connects man with his Creator and holds him to His throne. If that tie be all sundered, all broken, he floats away a worthless atom in the universe; its proper attractions all gone; its destiny thwarted, and its whole future nothing but darkness, desolation, and death. A man with no sense of religious duty is he whom the Scriptures describe in such terse but terrific language as living 'without God in the world.' Such a man is out of his proper being, out of the circle of all his duties, out of the circle of all his happiness, and away, far away, from the purposes of his creation."

She goes to the pastor of the richest and most fashionable church and confides in him. MATTHEW MORGAN & SONS, bankers, of New York, have suspended. The announcement caused a depression in the stock market, but it soon recovered and became steadier. The firm was an old one but did not belong to the stock exchange. The suspension is attributed to shrinkage in the values of railroad bonds, principally Denver & Rio Grande, of which they were large holders at high prices. Edward Morgan is expected from Europe in a few days. Their liabilities are mainly due on exchange, but they have no liabilities on the stock exchange. The members of the firm are large real estate owners, the New York hotel being one of their holdings, and it is believed that inability to realize on their real estate is the immediate cause of the suspension. The firm has been in business in the city for forty-five years. They came originally from New Orleans and have always been correspondents of several London houses. They rate at \$1,000,000.

ONE by one the millionaires, who have fraudulently acquired their immense wealth, are throwing up their hands and crying enough. The stocks, which they have been inflating, continue to have a downward tendency, and have not yet reached low water mark. Again comes the report that C. P. Huntington, of the Central Pacific, is hard pressed, and we should not be surprised to hear at any moment of his failure. Mrs. Colton, who is suing for a large amount, proposes to apply for a receiver of the stocks and bonds in custody of the Central Pacific, and in her petition she will assert her belief that the Central Pacific is on the verge of bankruptcy, on account of reckless management, and furthermore that a movement is on foot to send out all stocks and bonds involved in litigation. 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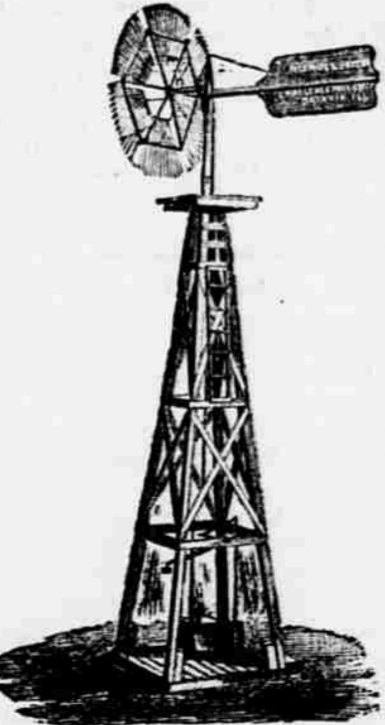
