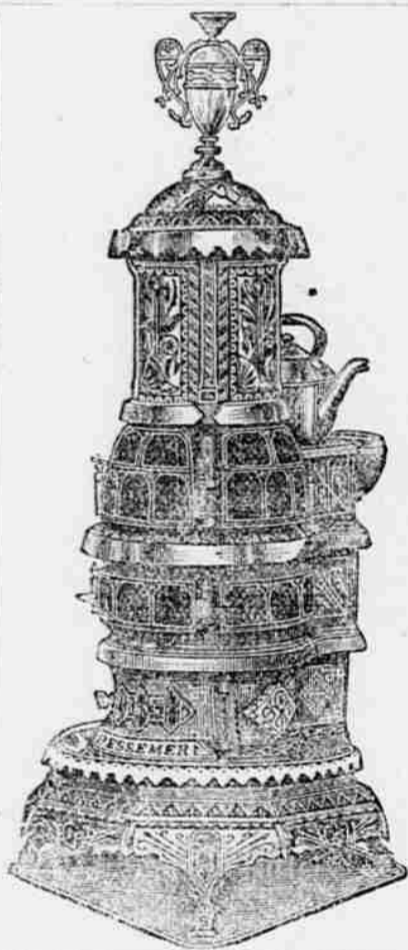

Six hundred miles of railroad will be

NEARLY one hundred of Oberlin's
