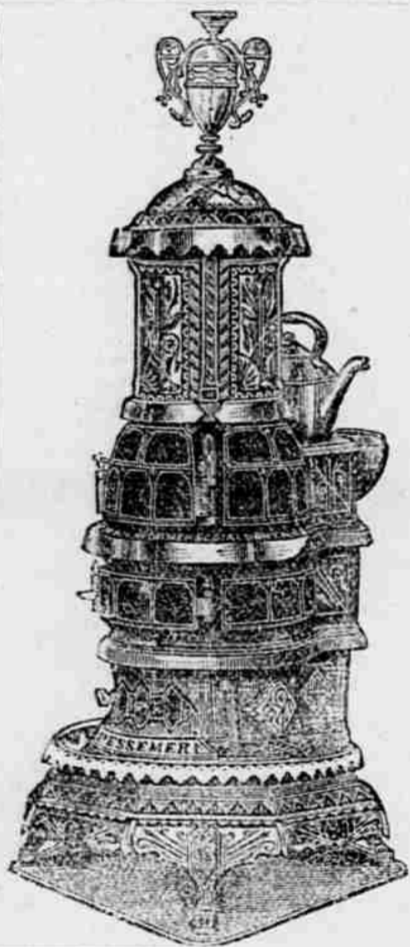

JOHN B. GOUGH, the veteran temperance lecturer, is dead. He was a native of England, and came to this country during early manhood to follow his trade of book binder. He became a drunkard, but finally reformed and entered the temperance field as a lecturer. He continued to preach temperance until a few months ago, when he became physically unable, owing to age and other causes, to carry on the work any longer. Mr. Gough was an eloquent orator, not only upon his favorite theme of temperance, but upon many other vital questions of the day. No man ever lived who worked harder to promote temperance, and the cause has lost in his death its most brilliant advocate.—Bee.

WHEN man began first to issue from the darkness of ignorance he was full of habits of crime and vice. By and by he learned more. He committed fewer crimes, but assumed new vices. Gradually he relegated some of his vices into the category of crimes, and enacted laws against them. A vice may be defined as something that is wrong, but not sufficiently disastrous to the public interest as to demand special and direct punishment. A man grows in intelligence and moral vices are more and more damaging and dangerous, and are therefore being gradually and steadily relegated to the list of crimes, to be suppressed by law. Drunkenness is an instance of a vice that is just now being classified where it belongs. It is essentially a crime against the body politic, and will shortly be so recognized by the laws of all states.—Topics.

God intended that men's interests should be mutual, and that we should not live for self alone.
