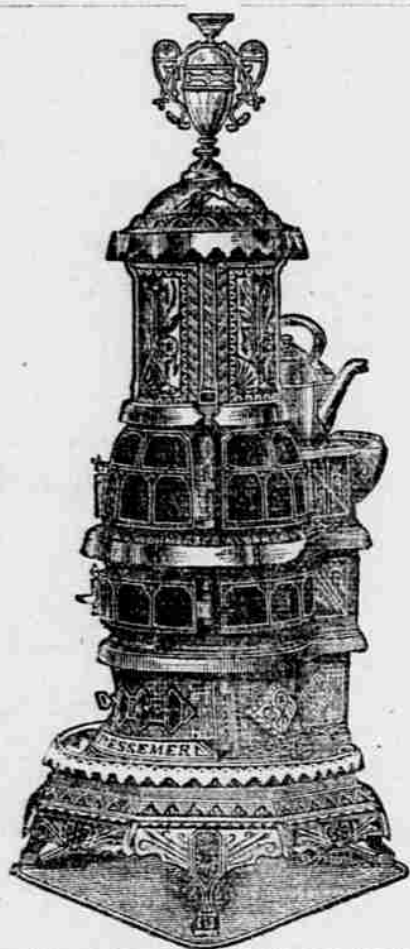

Mr. Wilson has introduced a bill in congress doubling the rate of postage on fourth class mail matter. This move is in the interest of the express companies, as it will rule out the small parcel delivery from the mails of the country. THE TRIBUNE believes this is an outrage on the people and hopes the Nebraska delegation will take no hand in it. It is of the greatest convenience to the people to be able to use the mail for transmitting small packages of merchandise from place to place without paying the stiff charges of the express companies.

The following eloquent passage is from the pen of George D. Prentice: "It cannot be that earth is man's abiding place. It cannot be that our lives are mere bubbles cast up by eternity, to float a moment on its waves and then sink into nothingness. Else why is it that the glorious aspiration which leaps like angels from the temple of one's heart are forever wandering unsatisfied? Why is it that the stars that hold their festival around the midnight throne are set alike the grasp of our limited faculty, forever mocking us with their unapproachable glory? And finally, why is it that bright forms of human beauty presented to our views are taken from us, leaving the thousand streams of affection to flow back in Alpine torrents upon our hearts? There is a realm where the rainbow never fades; where the stars will spread out before us like shadows, and will stay in our presence forever."

The hanging of Ford and Murphy at New Orleans has probably few parallels in the criminal annals of the country. Ford was a wealthy and respected citizen. His brother was a judge and had an enemy. The judge, his brother and five officers of the court waylaid the enemy and some of them shot him to death. It was shown that there was a conspiracy, the hanged men doing the shooting and the judge and others aiding and abetting. Murder had run riot so fearfully in New Orleans that all classes of citizens demanded that this crime should be punished. It has been, although powerful and long continued efforts were made to avert it. Two of the criminals are dead and the remainder in the penitentiary. The circumstance will doubtless have a salutary influence all over the country. It is much needed. From some reason or from some cause murder is frightfully on the increase. A return to the prompt and effective methods of the fathers would doubtless diminish the number of criminals. If New Orleans can hang and imprison leading and powerful citizens there is no reason why this horrid crime may not be punished and checked in all sections of the country. There is sore need that it should be.

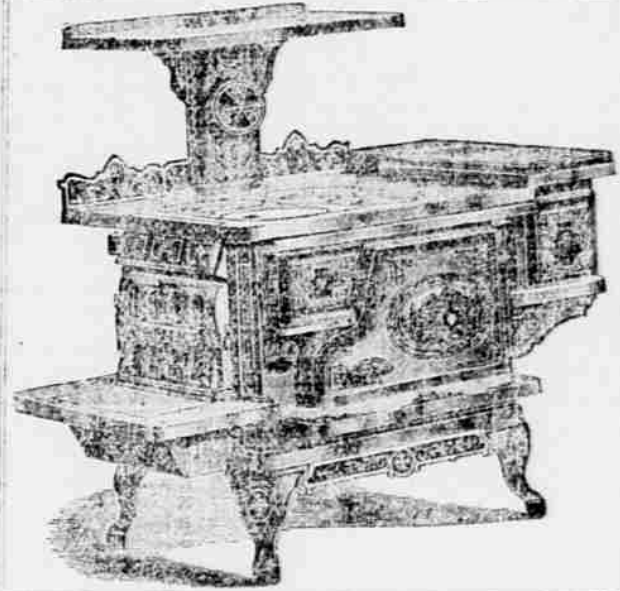
