reason why patents are not signed.

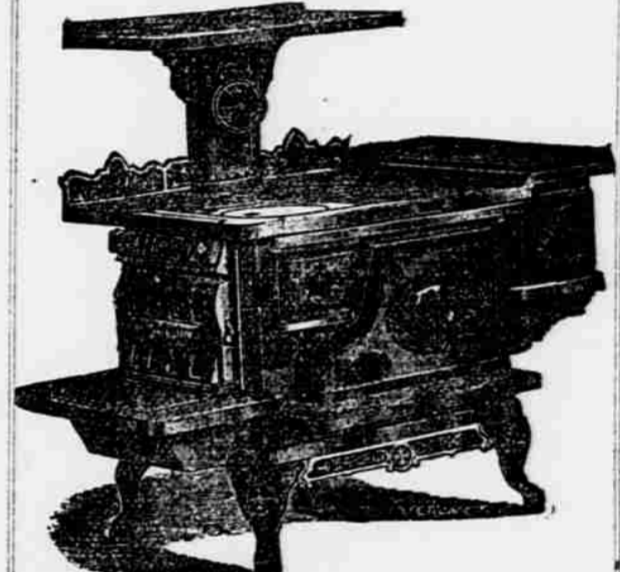
