MALLALIEU UNIVERSITY.

At a meeting held in Alma, Nebraska, April 15, 1888, the following was submitted:

WHEREAS, We have received the following proposition from The Lincoln Land Co., and Rev. Allen Bartley, in reference to the establishment of an institution of learning on the lands owned by said parties et al. between Indianola and Cambridge, Nebraska, on the line of the B. & M. R. R., in Nebraska:

The Lincoln Land Co. agrees to relinquish their interests in said lands to said institution of learning for a stipulated sum of money and the said Allen Bartley agrees to negotiate with the said company, for the said lands including one thousand (1000) acres of land, and to add to it a corresponding one thousand (1000) acres of land, adjacent to it on the west, and to give to the M. E. church two-thirds (2/3) interest in the said (2000) acres of land, for the benefit of said institution of learning, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the members of the Republican Valley District, West Nebraska Conference of the M. E. church, here assembled, do hereby approve the plan and do authorize the said Allen Bartley to negotiate for said lands and do recommend the immediate prosecution of said plans by the said Allen Bartley, and we the members of said District, both as a body, and individually, do hereby pledge our hearty support and earnest co-operation, and will act as individual agents in the furtherance of all his plans necessary to guarantee the success of said institution.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, That we recommend to the members of the District that they meet on said land at the call of the Presiding Elder of the District, for the purpose of the election of a Board of Trustees and do such other business as shall be deemed necessary.

A meeting of the ministers and laymen of the Republican Valley District, of the Methodist Episcopal church was called by Rev. P. C. Johnson, P. E., at Indianola, April 27, 1888.

The following named persons responded to the call: Revs. Allen Bartley, E. Smith, Wm. J. Pitchford, M. A. Castle, J. N. Bartels, F. F. Thomas, Wm. S. Wheeler, James Leonard, J. M. Mann, A. L. Greenlaw, C. Cox, F. M. Slusser, Geo. M. Boswell, J. A. Kleeburger, C. C. Crandall, Joseph Buckley. Also the following laymen: P. O. Cramer, I. T. Birdsall, Mr. Solomon, Ancel King, E. Peterman, James Hetherington, T. Teas and Irving Mott. These met at the parsonage of the District in Indianola, and were called to order by the Presiding Elder.

Rev. W. S. Wheeler was elected Secretary, and prayer offered by Rev. F. M. Slusser.

The following business was transacted: On motion, a petition to the District Judge was prepared, praying for the appointment of a commissioner to appraise the property in hands of the petitioners, preparatory to incorporation.

The contemplated town was named "BARTLEY" in honor of the Rev. Allen Bartley.

MALLALIEU UNIVERSITY was adopted as the name of the institution, subject to the approval of the Trustees.

A committee was appointed on articles of incorporation to report as soon as practicable.

Twenty-one Trustees were elected consisting of the following ministers and laymen: P. C. Johnson, Allen Bartley, G. M. Boswell, James Leonard, E. Peterman, Dr. C. K. Chubbuck, R. E. Stark, L. H. Eddleblute, F. F. Thomas, E. Smith, David E. Moore, B. F. Thompson, James Johns, F. O. Cramer, Wm. J. Pitchford, J. M. Mann, Wm. S. Wheeler, M. A. Castle, E. G. Neighbor, I. T. Birdsall.

Rev. Allen Bartley was made Financial Manager.

Rev. E. Thompson, Ph. D., was invited to

take the Presidency of the institution.

The meeting endorsed and ratified the acts of a previous meeting held at Alma.

The Board of Trustees organized by electing Revs. P. C. Johnson, President; James Leonard, Vice President; Wm. S. Wheeler, Secretary; Allen Bartley, Treasurer and Financial Agent.

George M. Boswell, E. Peterman, R. M. Stark, James Johns, D. E. Moore, as an executive committee to act in conjunction with the officers of the board.

The plan is substantially to locate an Educational Town in Western Nebraska, which shall by the sale of lots, other property, and by donations, create a building fund and provide for a perpetual endowment; and so place the University on a solid financial basis.

Bishop Mallalieu, who passed through the beautiful Republican Valley two years ago, was so charmed by its fertile soil, and wonderful possibilities, that he suggested at the Annual Conference the plan of securing a section of land, including 640 acres, on which to locate an Educational Town.

The development of this suggestion by the Reverend Allen Bartley is about to be realized in the Mallalieu University.

It is the design of the management to so incorporate and govern the town that all saloons, billiard halls, and places of questionable moral character shall be prohibited and that the highest social, moral and religious character prevail.

A Seminary of the highest grade is proposed for the first year or two, the building to be worth about \$10,000; to be followed immediately by the erection of the University buildings. The co-operation of all the friends of education and of this enterprise is cordially invited.

All persons desirous of securing a good business location, or an excellent residence site in a most promising Educational Town, are cordially invited to correspond with Rev. Allen Bartley, Indianola, Nebraska, or any of the persons herein named.

Provision has been made to secure to all Churches, who will erect creditable houses of worship, eligible sites.

McCLELLAN AND LEE.

FROM General McClellan's last magazine article in the May Century, we quote as follows: "General Lee and I knew each other well in the days before the war. We had served together in Mexico and commanded against each other in the Peninsula. I had the highest respect for his ability as a commander, and knew that he was not to be trifled with or carelessly afforded an opportunity of striking a fatal blow. Each of us naturally regarded his own army as the better, but each entertained the highest respect for the endurance, courage, and fighting qualities of the opposing army; and this feeling extended to the officers and men. It was perfectly natural under these circumstances that both of us should exercise a certain amount of caution: In my endeavors to ascertain Lee's strength, position, and intentions before I struck the final blow; he to abstain from any extended movements of invasion, and to hold his army well in hand until he could be satisfied as to the condition of the Army of the Potomac after its second Bull Run campaign, and as to the intentions of its commander."
