The objection, me thinks, to prohibition, by these people, is largely based upon the alleged failure of enforcement; while the consequent curtailment of "suppositious personal liverty," is likewise urged against the law, although nothing better is ever suggested by these objectors. But, we desire to call attention to a fact that anti-prohibitionists seem for the occasion to lose sight of, namely, the imperfection of all legal or moral machinery. The discriminations of men are never infallable, nor are their statutes. No matter how cautiously laws may be framed, the privileges of the few must be subservient to the best interests of humanity. It is at best but an approximation to perfect justice that we can from her injuries. hope for; this is, especially true of laws regulating public taste or appetite. The criterior by which the movement must be tested, is: What methods the least harm? Some harm will be done, and much good left undone. though the wisest plans be adopted: so that those measures must be appropriated and enforced, which on the whole, will secure the greatest good to the greatest number. So far no plans, we believe, have been devised better than prohibition. If its opponents have anything better to propose, give it to world instanter. They are looking for it. All agree as to the desirability of temperance, and temperance means to reach that consummation.
