For the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following state offices: Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor of Public Accounts, Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Attorney-General.

And for the transaction of such other business as may properly be presented to the convention.

The several counties are entitled to representation as follows—being based upon the vote cast for Leavitt Burnham, in 1885, for Regent of the University, with one delegate from each county for every one hundred and fifty votes and the major fraction thereof, and one delegate at large from each county:
