Its colonel was then made brigadier general for gallant and meritorious service, and during the battles named he served as commander of the second brigade of Wallace's division. Afterward he went to Memphis and commanded a brigade of Iowa troops at the battle of Chickasaw Bayou, then he led in the battle of Arkansas Post, in which over 5,000 prisoners were taken. Gen. Thayer served with distinction all through the siege of Vicksburg; for gallant and meritorious service was made a major general of volunteers. He participated in the capture of Jackson, Miss., under General Sherman; he was in the army of Arkansas under Gen. Steele, and also took a prominent part in the Jenkin's Ferry and Saline river. Afterward he had command of the army of the Frontier, and while at Ft. Smith he defeated the rebel generals Cooper and Maxey. After short service in command at Helena, on the Mississippi river, he closed his military career on July, 1865, and returned to Omaha. On admission of the territory as a state in 1866, he was elected United States Senator, and served one term. In 1875 he was appointed governor of Wyoming and served one year. General Thayer was born in Bellingham, Norfolk Co., Mass., and is now in the
