The semi-annual apportionment of school monies has been made by the State Superintendent. The number of pupils in the state is 256,455; the amount apportioned, \$282,370.68.

A telegram was received here, Monday, December 27, announcing the sudden death of John A. Logan, U. S. Senator from Illinois. There were memorial services held in this room, this (Thursday) A. M., in place of the usual opening exercises.

The public school, having been closed for nearly two weeks on account of the dreaded disease, diphtheria, re-opened, Monday, Dec. 30th, with an attendance of 41 in the high school department alone.
