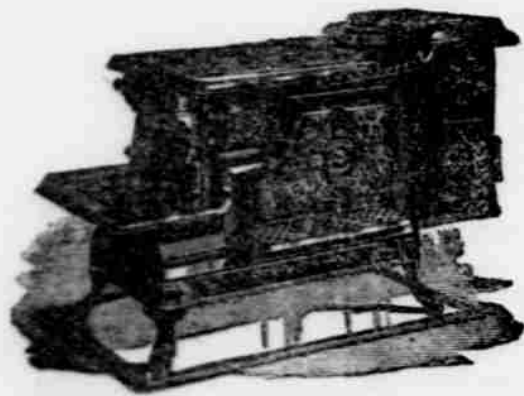

PRESIDENT McCOSH, in his new book on Psychology, says, "An onion and an apple if the nose be closed, cannot be distinguished from each other by taste." Incredible as this statement may appear to the inexperienced, it is nevertheless strictly true, as anyone can demonstrate by trial to his own satisfaction.

"WHEN a man dies in this busy, bustling western world he is soon forgotten. We cannot take time to grieve over the dead. If we stop for anything but a careless untiring struggle with the world, we get run over and trampled upon. No time for sadness, little time for common sympathy, and so on we go, struggling striving as best we can in the restless human current that moves surely and swiftly to the quiet and peace, the restful oblivion to which we have consigned our forgotten friends."

EX-JUDGE DILLON, general counsel of the Union Pacific company, has given to President Adams the following opinion on the effect of the Inter-State Commerce act on the subject of free passes:

"I have yours of the 28th inclosing copy of a letter addressed by you under date of January 28th, 1887, to S. R. Callaway, general manager of the Union Pacific Railway Company in which you state that sections 2 and 23 of the late Inter-State Commerce act seem to prohibit the giving of free passes to persons not connected with the service of the company or traveling upon business in which it has no interest. You ask me whether this view is correct. Obviously many difficult and delicate questions will arise as to what is an undue and reasonable preference, advantage, or discrimination within the provisions of the act; but taking the scope of the act, and reading sections 1, 3, and 22 together, my opinion is that railroad companies which are subject to the provisions of the act are prohibited from issuing complimentary passes for any species of free travel not disconnected with inter-state communication or commerce. Certainly, until it is judicially decided otherwise, your conclusion not to issue such passes is the one dictated by prudence."
