The Republicans of Red Willow County  
Ratify the Nominations of "Ben"  
Harrison and Levi P. Morton.

ENTHUSIASM UNBOUNDED!

Monster Torchlight Procession,  
Stirring Speeches, Every-  
body Happy but

THE DISCONSOLATE DEMOCRACY.

The ratification of the nominations of General Benjamin Harrison and Levi P. Morton, as their national standard bearers, by the Republicans of Red Willow county, in this city, last Saturday night, completely eclipsed anything of the kind that has ever transpired in Western Nebraska, both as to numbers engaged therein and the unbounded, spontaneous enthusiasm which prevailed throughout and marked the every feature of the occasion. Republicans from all over the county, as well as from adjoining counties, swelled the ranks of the confident and alert Republicans of McCook. Five hundred yeoman marched in the monster torchlight procession, headed by the bands and music of the city. Stirring speeches were made by Geo. H. Grubb, of Indianola, William Weygant of Box Elder, and J. B. Jennings of this city, their utterances on the political issues of the day being accompanied by prolonged cheering, showing that the people are alive to the vital points involved in this national campaign and indicating their absolute confidence in the republican party and its standard bearers. Campaign songs, an immense bon-fire on the hillside added their mite to a rousing ratification in every essential particular.

Joy of Birmingham, Ala., makes the following statement: "It is not true, as the free traders allege, that the consumer pays the amount of protection duty. The competition of home manufacture reduces profits to a fair return for capital. The comparison below of prices in 1850, which were taken from a Georgia merchant's ledger of that date, with the prices of the same articles in 1888, shows the hollowness of the pretense:

1850. 1888.  
Nails, per pound, \$10. 8.05.  
Calico, per yard, .12 1/2. .07.  
Trace Chains, per pr. 1.00. .50.  
Socks, per pair, .10. .05.  
AXES, 1.25. .75.

As 1850 was a year of low tariff and 1888 of high tariff, we should have expected to find prices higher in 1888, than in 1850, but not so. So long as foreigners controlled our markets, we had to pay their prices. When we began to manufacture, prices began to be regulated by the cost of production."

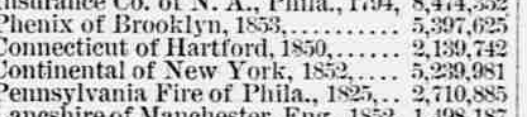
