If you have a lock box go to the postoffice without the key.
After getting your mail inquire if there is something more.
If you get a Wells, Fargo money order go to the postoffice to get it cashed.
If you want a money order or postal note ask the postmaster for a postal order.
If you do not get your mail when you expect it, ask the postmaster when she will arrive.
When people are waiting for their mail, get in the window and chin the postmaster half an hour or now to distribute mail. He will appreciate it.
If you have half a dozen children send them all to the postoffice for the mail, as it is a great comfort to the postmaster to look over the mail for them in turn as they arrive.
