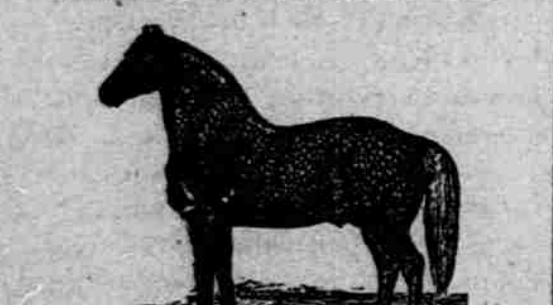

### Commissioners' Proceedings.

COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE,  
Indianola, Neb., May 14, 1889.

Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Stephen Bolles, Henry Crabtree and C. T. Blackman, commissioners, and Geo. W. Roper, clerk.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Resignation of Alva Gansby, constable for Indianola precinct, read and approved. On motion Henry Crabtree was appointed constable for Indianola precinct to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Alva Gansby.

Resignation of William Brinkman, overseer road district No. 32, read and approved, and on motion J. R. P. Rowe was appointed overseer road district No. 32 to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Wm. Brinkman.

Resignation of Charles Colling, overseer road district No. 3, read and approved, and W. B. Spain appointed to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Charles Colling.

On motion the following official bonds were approved:

Henry Crabtree, constable for Indianola precinct.

J. R. P. Rowe, overseer road district No. 32.

W. B. Spain, overseer road district No. 3.

Petition of C. H. Boyle, G. W. Kalme and others asking for a public road, read and considered. The board finds that all requirements of law have been fully complied with and no claims for damage filed.

On motion same was granted establishing a public road, as follows:

Commencing at a point on section line, 21 chains, 7 links west of E. corner section 23, town 4, range 29 W., running south 3 degrees, 30 seconds, W. 12 chains, thence west 13 chains, thence south 14 chains, thence south 90 degrees, east 10 chains, thence south 3 degrees, east 30 chains, thence south 2 degrees, east 20 chains, thence south 53 degrees, east 30 chains to section line, thence west on section line to S. W. corner section 4, town 3, range 29 W., and terminating thereat.

Petition of A. C. Nettleton, Andrew Carson and others, read and considered. The board find that all the requirements of law have been complied with, but that the general public do not require the establishment of said road, and on motion, same was rejected.

The question of the constitutionality of the butchers' inspection bill, which has passed the legislatures of New Mexico, Colorado and Minnesota, was submitted for the opinion of Judge George W. THE perpetual, tremendous, and truly awful surprise which certain Democratic journals profess to feel at their discovery of the fact that General Benjamin Harrison is, in the fullest sense of the term, president of the United States is about the most funny thing in the politics of the day.

THERE went into effect, Sunday, on the Vanderbilt railroads, the new policy for that system, of discontinuing the running of all freight trains on Sundays except those which carry live stock and perishable goods. This policy was introduced, some time ago, on the Erie road, and subsequently on the Delaware and Hudson and several of the southern roads, in all these cases with satisfactory results. The New England roads have also found it advantageous to discontinue Sunday freight trains. The arrangement is understood to have been under consideration by the managers of the Vanderbilt system for a considerable time before the decision was reached, and it is understood that the plan is to be introduced simply as an experiment, the order not contemplating its permanent establishment. It will afford a large number of employees a day of rest, but it will also reduce their pay to that extent. If the plan works successfully on the Vanderbilt system it will very likely become general.
