A ROYAL WELCOME.

Alex. McD. McCook, and two
members of his staff, Captain J.
G. D. Knight and Captain W. H.

she is in her bright and patriotic
garb for the auspicious occasion.
The program of the day was then

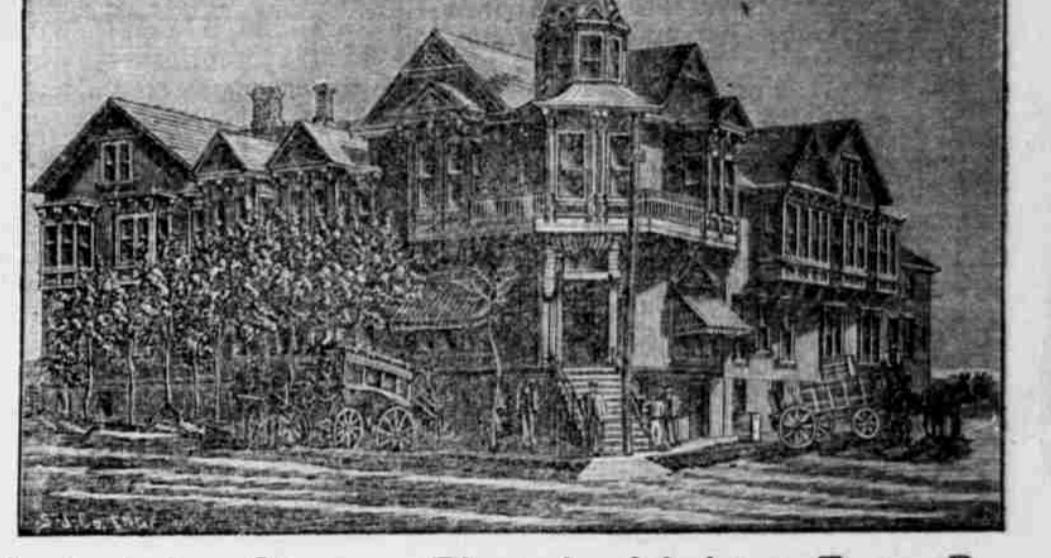
In the way of decorations, we
