ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

NAME—The name and style of this corporation shall be the Bank of McCook.

PLACE OF BUSINESS—The principal place of business of this corporation is the city of McCook, Red Willow county, Nebraska.

THE PURPOSE AND BUSINESS OF THIS CORPORATION—The receipt of money on deposit and loaning the same, discounting commercial paper, selling and buying foreign and domestic exchange, the negotiation of loans on real estate security, the investment of money in real estate or other securities, the purchase and sale of such real estate and personal property as shall be considered desirable for its own use or profit or necessary for the collection or securing of any claims or debts owing to or in which this bank may have an interest, and the purchase and sale of municipal and government bonds.

CAPITAL—The capital stock of this corporation shall be the sum of \$50,000.00 (Fifty Thousand Dollars) which shall be paid in cash at the time said corporation may commence business. This corporation shall commence business on the first day of July, 1890, and continue 30 years, unless the stockholders shall conclude to surrender its charter or dissolve the same.

LIABILITIES—The liabilities of this corporation shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock of said corporation, subject to the provisions of section 128 of the incorporated laws of the state of Nebraska applicable to the business done by this corporation.
