FIGHTING LIVELY.

LINCOLN, NEB., Aug. 5.—A staff correspondent of this bureau interviewed J. H. Craddock, State Secretary of the Knights of Labor, who declares himself heartily in favor of the adoption of the Prohibitory Amendment. He said: "No, sir, I was not opposed to endorsing prohibition in the Independent People's platform, but the committee thought best not to undertake too many things. I am in favor of constitutional prohibition, and shall vote for it next November. I have repeatedly committed myself to the measure. I believe fully three-fourths of the Independent voters will cast their ballots for prohibition."

The Logan county Republican Convention declared almost unanimously for the Prohibitory Amendment. The tall grass is full of prohibits out there, they say.
Forty-five real estate dealers in Lincoln have signed the Prohibition Business Men and Bankers list in opposition to Roggen, Rosewater and Rum. Besides this, two hundred other business men are down the same way, with many more to hear from. The taxation bugaboo has turned into a grinning skeleton that makes the license fellows' knees quake. They raised the false hue and cry about ruinous taxation as a result of prohibition. Every comparison so far from official records has knocked the license claims in the head. The latest table on taxation compares

All three of these cities have gone forward with public improvements in grading streets, sewerage and water works facilities, paving and lighting, but the monstrous difference between the taxation in Lincoln, the high license city and her Prohibition neighbors passes all bounds of reason and enters the domain of public robbery.
Henry Brugman of Lincoln, the German editor, has begun the organization of "Personal Rights Leagues" throughout the State, for the purpose of arraying the foreign-born citizenship against the home-protectors of this country. Mr. Brugman will find a rocky road to travel. While he undertakes to manipulate the German vote, he will find thousands of loyal Germans who are Americans when it comes to destroying the anarchist American saloon.

There is a busy worker at headquarters in this city who toils day and night in the multiplying correspondence of this Amendment campaign. He is well known throughout Nebraska, as he used to be Grand Secretary of the Good Templars. He was Secretary of the Second Congressional Central Committee in 1888. He ran for Secretary of State and placed in away ahead of his ticket. He is now speaker's clerk at headquarters and knows no idle hour. His name is John E. Hopper of Clay county.
The fight for the Amendment should now be more generally transferred from the cities to the country districts. Unless more school districts are reached, thousands of votes will be lost by default. This warning has been sounded before and should certainly be heeded. County and State committees, club officers, and local workers should utilize home talent and during September and October there should be from twenty to fifty meetings each week in the school districts.
The outlook grows more encouraging daily as the weeks keep speeding toward November.

It Is Well Named.

An important suit was yesterday filed in the district court, wherein W. J. McGillen is plaintiff and the Kit Carson Cattle Company is defendant. Sheriff McClay and the Union Savings Bank are made parties defendant. Plaintiff shows that he purchased some time last year a lot of horses and cattle, formerly the property of the Harlem Cattle Company of Stratton, which were sold at receiver's sale to satisfy a judgment obtained by the Kit Carson company. On the 5th of May last he brought sixty-five head of the horses to this city, and that while here they were attached by Sheriff McClay for the Kit Carson company, who claimed that they were the property of E. M. McGillen, who, the company claimed, was indebted to them on notes to the extent of \$82,600. The stock was sold by Sheriff McClay and by agreement between the contending parties, the proceeds of the sale, some \$19,000, was placed in the Union Savings Bank. W. J. McGillen contends that he owned the stock and hence brings suit to recover the money and two horses unsold and now in possession of the sheriff.—Tuesday's State Journal.

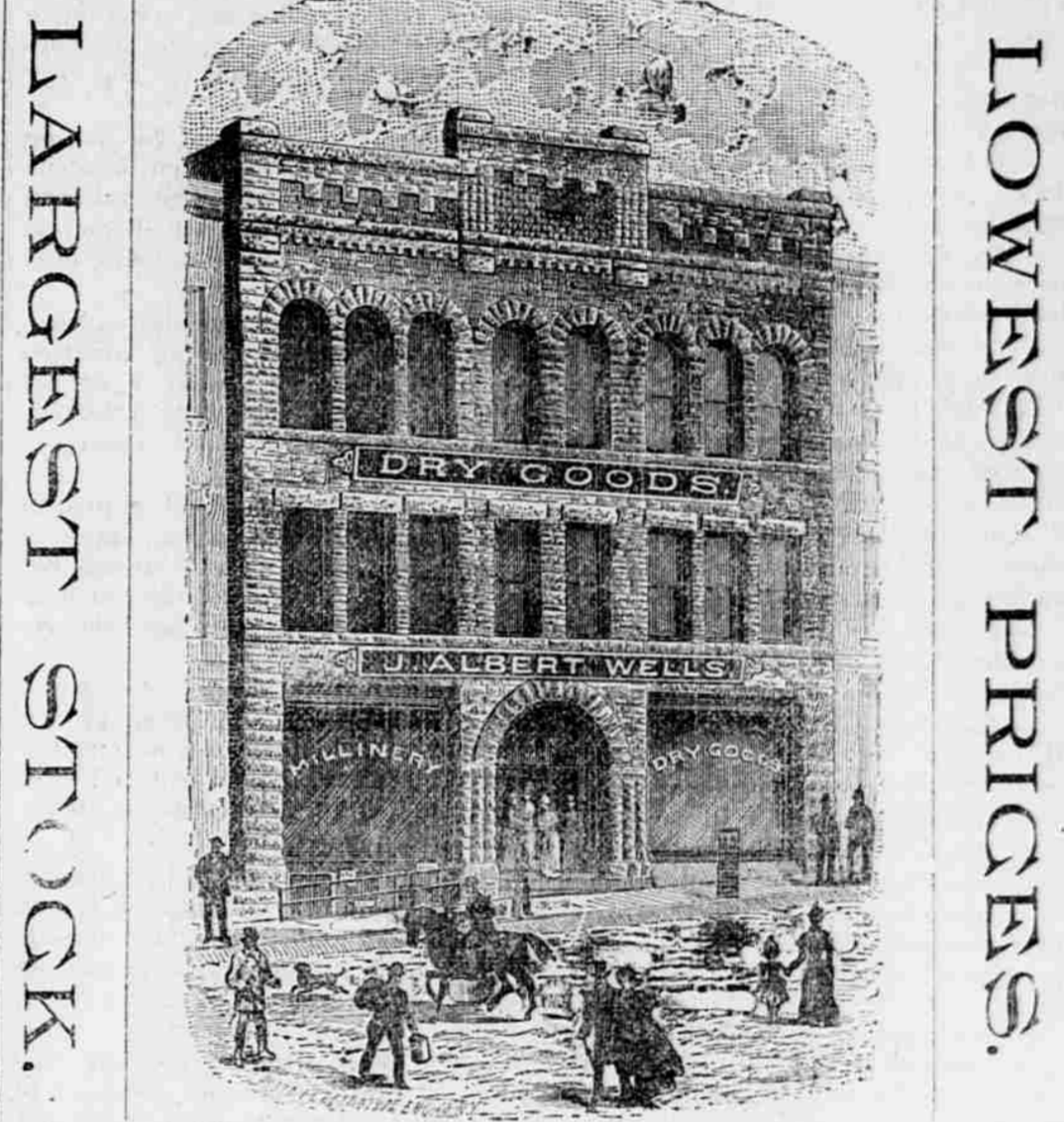
