How We Get the Time.

 At precisely 12 o'clock every day the Naval observatory at Washington telegraphs the time all over the country. The instruments of the Western Union are in the room where the computations are made, and just three and a half minutes before noon operating ceases in telegraph offices all over the country, at great loss and inconvenience some times. The wires are then put in unbroken connection with Washington. A note of warning is sent a few seconds in advance, and at the second when the observer notes the passage of the sun over the seventy-fifth meridian, the electric current flashes the news all over the country, and thousands of clocks—7,000 in New York city alone, it is said—are daily regulated by this record of solar time.


