The 7,000,000 republican voters were slightly divided prior to the convention, but next November will reveal the fact that they are an irresistible unit.

The state election in Oregon leaves no doubt as to where the electoral vote of that state will be found in November. It was a republican victory, clean and decisive.

NEBRASKA'S ever busy senator, A. S. Paddock, has introduced a bill providing for the appropriation of \$150,000 for the purchase of eighty acres of land and the erection of a soldiers' home in Beatrice.

PARTY lines this year, as in 1888, will be drawn on the tariff question, and every fair-minded and well-posted voter must admit that republican changes have been greatly strengthened by the highly satisfactory working of the McKinley law.

Two bills have passed the house providing for the admission of the territories of New Mexico and Arizona to statehood. As the measures are not likely to meet with opposition while taking the regular course, the American flag will probably contain forty-six stars before the close of the present year.

Col. L. L. Polk, president of the national farmer's alliance, died at 11:15 Saturday. Col. Polk was of great value to his party as a stump speaker and was an able writer on topics of particular interest to farmers. The people's party will meet in national convention in Omaha, July 4th, and the probability is that had Col. Polk survived he would have been nominated for president or vice president if the party should have decided to put a ticket in the field.

It is said that Governor McKinley was a wholly inexperienced presiding officer before taking the chair at Minneapolis. Although he had been in congress twelve years he had no opportunity to preside over that body, and his friends feared that the task of keeping the convention in order would be too much for even a chairman of the widest experience. Taking these facts into consideration the justice, promptness and clearness of all his ruling was remarkable. Governor McKinley distinguished himself by his control of the unwieldy body, and the knowledge that he did it without previous preparation will greatly increase the admiration felt for him by the republicans of the nation.

THE State Reunion, G. A. R., for the year 1892, will be held at Grand Island, August 29th to September 3d inclusive. A rate of one fare for the round trip has been announced from all parts of the State on all railroads. The attendance is expected to be larger than in any previous year. A programme is being arranged with a view to having it particularly pleasing to all Veterans, Sons and Daughters of Veterans and members of the Womens' Relief Corps. It will embrace some new attractive features not heretofore witnessed at any reunion in Nebraska. Camp accommodations will be more ample than ever before in every respect, and the Camp will be located on the same ground it occupied last year. THE agony is over, and Benjamin Harrison has been nominated for the presidency of the United States to succeed himself. The friends of Mr. Blaine stuck to him to the last moment but they were not numerous enough to nominate. Harrison received the nomination on the first ballot having nearly one hundred votes to spare. There is no republican in the country but who is satisfied with the nomination. Mr. Harrison's administration has challenged the admiration of the whole world and under it the United States has prospered during the past four years as it has never prospered before. Hurrah for Harrison, the president and the next president of the United State.

THE point is made by contemporaries as the fact that the sentiment of his party at large favored Harrison's nomination made him invincible. A like force insures the nomination of Cleveland. There is a difference, however. The feeling that Harrison had fairly earned renomination according to precedent, and that it would be unfair not to give him a second chance, does not apply to Cleveland's case. Though the rank and file of his party are for him, yet the fact that he has had his two chances and failed in the later one may be used against him with powerful effect by the cooler heads at Chicago.—Journal.

COLONEL BOB INGERSOLL has a little lawsuit of his own against Rev. Dr. Dixon for libel. The clergyman has put in a very voluminous answer to the colonel's petition, and the colonel wanted the court to strike out a good deal of it, but the court refused. As it is given out that the colonel has agreed to leave New York and go back to Peoria as a preacher of the gospel, in case the doctor downs him in this suit, the interest of the public in the mill will increase daily until the jury renders its verdict.—Journal.

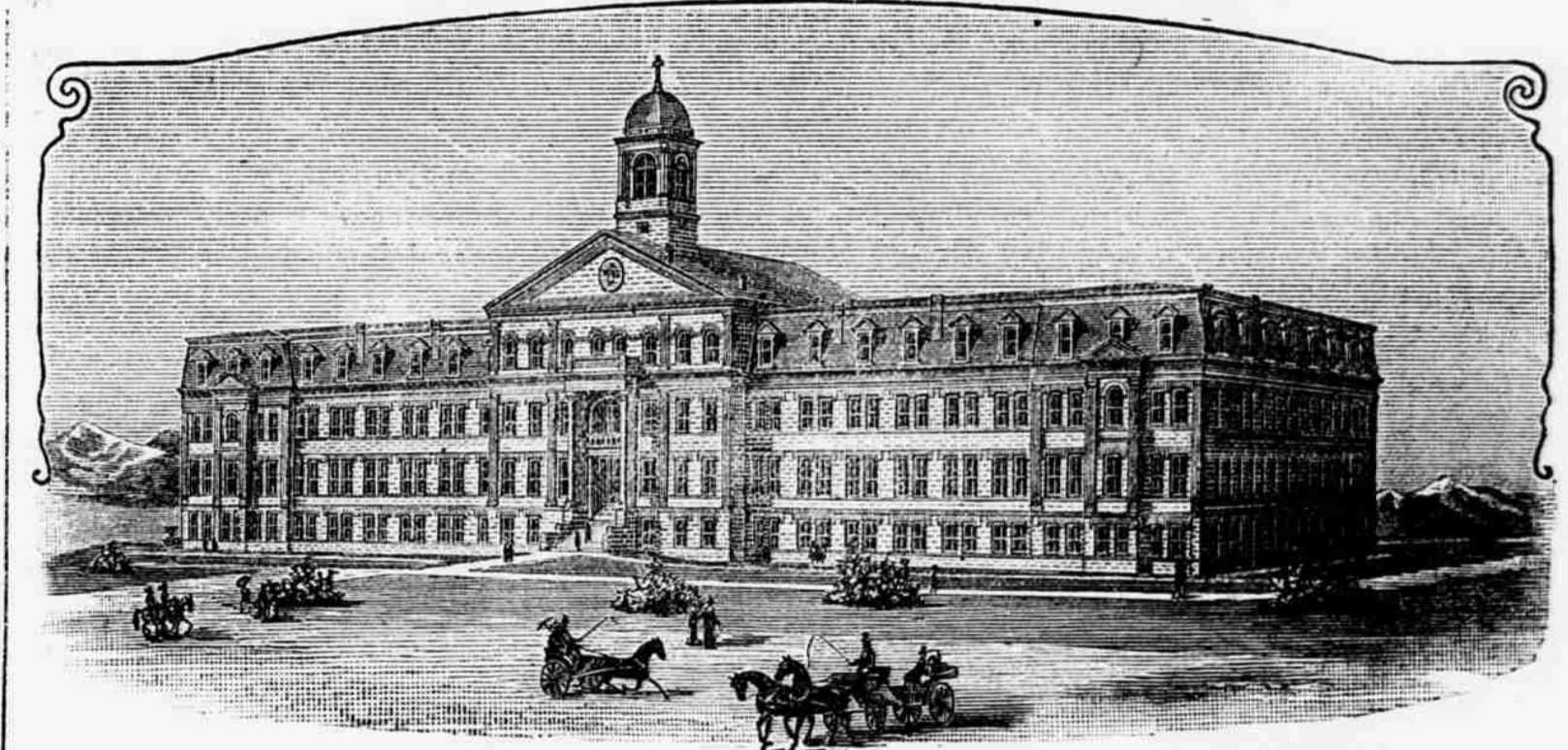
