**COPY OF McCOOK'S GUARANTEE**

WHICH IS NOW ON FILE WITH COUNTY CLERK AT INDIANOLA.

We, the undersigned, residents of the City of McCook, in Red Willow county, State of Nebraska, interested in the location of the county seat of said county at said city of McCook, do hereby represent and guarantee to Red Willow county that said city of McCook will pledge the property and credit of the said city of McCook upon its negotiable bonds in the amount of \$13,200.00, to be used for the purpose of aiding in building, erecting, constructing and furnishing a County Court House, to be built and erected on the south half of block 11, in the First Addition to the said city of McCook, and that said sum of money to be so obtained will be used in building, erecting and furnishing a court house at said city of McCook, according to such plans and specifications as may be adopted by the county commissioners of said county, and for no other purpose; and that said city of McCook will donate and cause to be conveyed by a good and sufficient deed to said Red Willow county the south half of said block 11, to be used as a site for a court house and other county seat buildings, if the electors of said county shall at the election to be held on the first day of August, 1892, locate the county seat of said county at the said city of McCook. If the said city of McCook does not pay into the county treasury of said county said sum of \$13,200.00, on the conditions and terms aforesaid, and procure for the county a good and sufficient deed to the south half of said block 11, on or before the first day of October, 1892, then, and in that case, we, the undersigned, do personally promise and agree that we will pay into the treasury of said county on or before the 15th day of October, 1892, any deficiency of said sum of \$13,200.00 that has not been paid into said county treasury, on the conditions and for the purposes aforesaid, by said city of McCook, and also procure for said county a good and sufficient title to the south half of said block 11 for county seat purposes.

And all the foregoing to be fully done and performed without any expense to tax payers and citizens of said county, other than the tax payers and citizens of the city of McCook.
