THE idea of driving in wagons or riding on horseback to the Populist state convention at Grand Island, August 15, seems to be a popular one in this section of Nebraska.

WE have not the temerity to offer this as a remedy for our commercial, financial, industrial or common ills, but there is enough money wasted annually for liquors to keep every laborer at work and provide him a comfortable home.

THE people of the United States expended in 1890 \$24,000,000 for police, \$12,000,000 for prisons and reformatories and \$23,000,000 for the support of the judiciary. Viewed in this light crime seems to be about the most expensive luxury in which this country indulges.

FOR years the state of New Jersey has been the resort of persons who wanted to marry and could not comply with the legal requirements of the states where they resided. Matrimonial mills in all the cities of the state did a flourishing business and preachers and magistrates reaped a rich harvest. This state of things has been done away with, the legislature having passed a marriage license bill that is stringent in its provisions. Reform makes slow progress in New Jersey, but this last is one of the most commendable in recent years.

THE Bee has always contended that the statistics of Nebraska's mortgage indebtedness as reported by the deputy commissioner of labor, were incorrect and misleading. Under the law of Nebraska every mortgage is sure to be recorded; but when the mortgage is paid off the releases are filed or not, just as it happens. In Adams county an effort has been made to have the old releases placed on record. As a result of the effort 800 releases have been filed, one firm of chattel mortgage brokers filing 500. This means that in Adams county alone 800 mortgages have been carried on the mortgage indebtedness record after they had been paid off. A similar condition exists in every county in the state. When releases are recorded as promptly and as certainly as the mortgages themselves, Nebraska's credit will receive a new and higher rating.—Omaha Bee.

At Denver, Tuesday, by a vote of 59 to 56 W. V. Powell of Wichita, Kansas, was elected grand chief telegrapher over D. C. Ramsey. This contest has been vigorous and the result leaves the order of railway telegraphers in not the greatest of harmony. This is considered to indicate the supremacy of the commercial telegraphers over the railway operators. The other officers elected are M. M. Dolphin, Kansas City, assistant grand chief; J. Wetherbee, Vinton, Iowa, secretary and treasurer; J. R. T. Austin, Toledo, O., grand editor and manager; T. M. Pierson, Terre Haute, Ind., senior; J. E. Stinson, Dallas, Texas, junior; W. Question of Law.

BENKELMAN, Neb., May 29.—[Special.]—Today, Oscar Callihan and L. Morse of the Dundy County Irrigation Company served an injunction upon parties using water for irrigation purposes out of Rock creek, a tributary of the Republican, which empties into the latter stream just above the big ditch, situated west of town. This lessened their water supply and the question involved the right of parties to use water out of tributaries that empty into streams above and near where ditches are taken out when the use of such water interferes with the operation of the ditch. It is a question of importance and its final decision will be awaited with much interest by irrigationists of Nebraska.—Lincoln Journal.
