J. F. Custer has removed to McCook and is now running out of there on the main line. It is said from the Burlington headquarters that there is no immediate prospect of building through the Big Horn Basin, as a telegram from Cheyenne says. George W. Loomis, chief clerk to General Manager Holdrege said that there were no plans for building the road, but the matter had been talked of. If this be true the boys here could better afford to make an agreement to spend their checks in McCook. They would get more wages and have a firmer stand-in.—Republican City Democrat.
