There is no work to be had beyond the needs of the local laborers in any part of the country, and strangers are not so liberally treated in the matter of assistance as residents. The pioneers who remain on their farms through the winter will be the ones to share most liberally in the prosperous year that we are all sure will follow the unprecedented drouth of 1894. —Lincoln Journal.
