EX-SENATOR WILSON of Iowa joined the "innumerable caravan", first of this week.

THE coroner's jury has fixed the crime of murdering Minnie Williams of San Francisco on Durant.

ACCORDING to the London Times the amount spent in England and Wales during the half year ended Michaelmas, 1894, was exactly \$11,506,240.

The income tax law will have another inning on the 6th of next month, the argument for rehearing to be heard by the full bench of nine.

MAJ. GEN. A. MCD. MCCOOK retired on Monday. It seems quite certain that Brigadier General Wesley Merritt will get the extra star.

SECRETARY MORTON of interior department distinctly smells a beef combine, and bases his belief on the trust's own denial recently uttered through their official trade organ.

JOHN BULL has nineteen men-of-war available to compel Nicaragua to cough up those \$75,000, and announces that he will institute a "pacific blockade" of Nicaraguan ports until the money is forthcoming.

MRS. E. R. LANE of Manchester, N. H., sent her husband's "old gray overcoat" out to the drouth sufferers of Furnas county. \$130 were sewed up in the lining of the coat. They are poor people and would like to have the money back.

THE Furnas County Bank suspended payment, last Friday morning. The financial grind is gradually taking in the weaker and smaller banks. The general merchandising firm of Blackman Bros., who were also large owners of the bank's stock, also failed.

THE merchants of Omaha have decided to give a carnival display during the state fair. The name for the carnival has been determined upon: "The Knights of Ak Sar Ben," which you will observe is the name of our state cut into three sections and spelled backwards.

THE Chicago Times-Herald has passed into the control of H. H. Kohlsaat, formerly of the Inter-Ocean, who has purchased a controlling interest in the stock. The policy and politics of the paper are thus epitomized: "Upon this simple platform the Times-Herald takes its stand: Political independence at all times, protection to American industries, sound money and complete non-partisanship in municipal affairs."

THE supreme court of Maine has decreed that profane language on a street car justifies the conductor in ejecting the offending person. The decision goes into the matter at some length, reciting that the use of indecent or profane language is a breach of the peace, and that it is the duty of the conductor to check such language, even to the point of arresting the offender and holding him until a warrant may be sworn out or until he can be placed in the custody of the proper officers of the law. Nothing is said in this decision about the man who expectorates on the floor, but if he ever comes up before this court he will receive no mercy.—Journal.

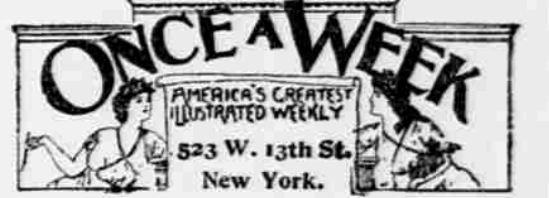
