A MINIATURE SEA.

in Utah There Is an Artificial Lake with Waves Like the Ocean.

Out in southwestern Utah there is an irrigating reservoir covering so large an area in the open sandy desert that the wind has a sweep sufficient to raise waves five or six feet high. About eight miles of the border of this reservoir is an artificial bank, and unless a method of keering the waves off this bank were adopted the owners of the property would some day find that most of the stored water had escaped through

To provide the necessary protection an inexpensive breakwater was constructed, which was recently described by W. P. Hardesty in an article on the Swan Lake works, of which the reservoir is a part. 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
