Walter C., son and only child of Mr. and Mrs. William Epperly, was born at Fremont, Mahaska county, Iowa, June 23, 1879, and died near McCook, Nebraska, February 4th, 1896. His sickness was of but a few days duration, but his death did not find him unprepared. The day before he died he said to his mother: "This is not my home, I am going up higher"; and then just before he died he said, "I hear music", and his spirit took its departure to join that heavenly choir. Walter's parents came to this country and settled in this county when he was but a child, so he had spent most of his life in the west and had grown in and acquired much of the western energy without developing any of its roughness; and although but a boy in years he had cultivated a spiritual and moral growth that had matured into a noble character. Being of a kind and genial disposition he was the favorite of a large circle of associates among whom his presence seemed to be an inspiration for a higher and better life. He was recognized by the young people of his community as a leader, and this indeed was fortunate as his example and influence was an uplift to those of older years, and only eternity can unfold the good his life has been to others. The funeral was preached by the writer at Zion Hill church, using for his text Isaiah's words to Hezekiah: "Set thine house in order for thou shalt die". The church would not hold the great company of people who came to pay respects to one they so much loved. The church being filled largely with the young companions of the deceased. The discourse partook of the nature of an address to the young people. The body was laid to rest in Zion Hill cemetery, there to sweetly sleep until it shall be called forth, when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption and this mortal shall have put on immortality.
