NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO VOTE BONDS.
Whereas, more than fifty petitioners, each being a resident elector and taxpayer within the city of McCook in Red Willow county, Nebraska, have petitioned the Mayor and Council of said City of McCook to call a special election in and for said city for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said city a proposition to issue the bonds of said city in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars for the purpose of aiding in the erection and construction of a court house within the city of McCook, the county seat of Red Willow county, Nebraska.

Said bonds to be issued in a series of five hundred dollars each, to bear interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum, payable annually on the first day of May each year after the issuance of said bonds.

Said bonds to mature in twenty years from date thereof, but all or any of said bonds to be payable at the option of the City of McCook at any time after five years from the date thereof.

Said petition being dated April 16th, 1896, and filed in the office of the city clerk, April 25th, 1896.
