RAILROAD NEWS-NOTES.

"R. R. B." Mail Matter.

The circular recently issued by Postmaster General Wilson drawing the lines closely about all railway mail has had the effect of causing the railroads to look closely into the matter and to see that no violations of the postal provisions are permitted. There are two customs that will have to go: The exchange of railroad mail from one road to another, and the sending of personal letters by one employe of a road to another employe in envelopes marked "R. R. B."

To guard against any such abuses General Manager Holdrege of the B. & M. has issued the following circular:
"Under the United States postal regulations we are permitted to carry free, as train mail, only such letters, papers and other documents as relate to the business of this railroad. It is important that no personal letters of employes or any other mail matter than that specified as above shall be carried as 'R. R. B.' mail. Officers and employes are directed, to see that these regulations are complied with".
