SENATOR ALLEN wont rest comfortably until Cuba is free, and he is fathering a bill to that effect.

SENATOR ALLISON predicts a strong fight in the senate against the annexation of Hawaii, and intimates that the scheme may be defeated. But, conceding that Mr. Allison's apprehensions are well grounded, there is really no cause for consternation. The United States has managed to get on without Hawaii for a hundred years or such a matter, and would not go to the dogs if the proposition to absorb the Kanakas were turned down by the senate, which has done a great many worse things than that would be.

THE president strongly urges the necessity of a change in currency laws which will release the government from the obligation of paying out gold in settlements without imposing the same obligations upon its debtors.

He questions the advisability of recognizing the belligerency of Cuba and recommends that Spain, under the Sagasta ministry, be given a fair trial along present lines of reform, promising at the same time vigorous action in behalf of the island if promised reforms are not carried out and an honorable settlement of the war speedily effected.

Annexation of Hawaii is advocated and an early ratification of the pending treaty urged.

The work of the international bimetallic commission is explained, and the belief expressed that something to the advantage of the United States will eventually result from the conference.

The president favors the purchase by the government of the Kansas Pacific branch in case private bids are insufficient to recoup the government.

Attention is called to the necessity of special legislation in behalf of Alaska.

Congress is asked to exercise economy in appropriations.
