We had an interesting literary, last Thursday night. The program was good and the debate lively.

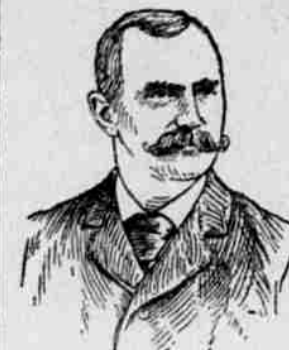
Red Willow, it was kind of you to leave such nice work for us to do. Yes, poetic effusions are in our line and we can scribble them off most any time.
