#### OBITUARY.

William R. Baley was born in Nashville, Tenn., June 17, 1838, and died April 8, 1899, ten miles north of Bartley, being at death 60 years, 9 months and 21 days old. He was married to Electa Olds on July 24, 1859. In March, 1855, he moved west with his family and located for a time in Lancaster county, Neb., where he lived until 1890, when he came to Frontier county and located on a quarter section of land near Mount Zion M. E. church, where he resided until his death. He leaves a wife and several children, all grown. Some years ago Father Baley was violently thrown from a wagon, striking his head against a stump, and sustained severe injuries from which he suffered as an invalid for years, his mind at times being impaired. The funeral services were conducted from the Mount Zion church on Sunday afternoon by M. S. Foutch and the remains quietly laid to rest in the church cemetery.

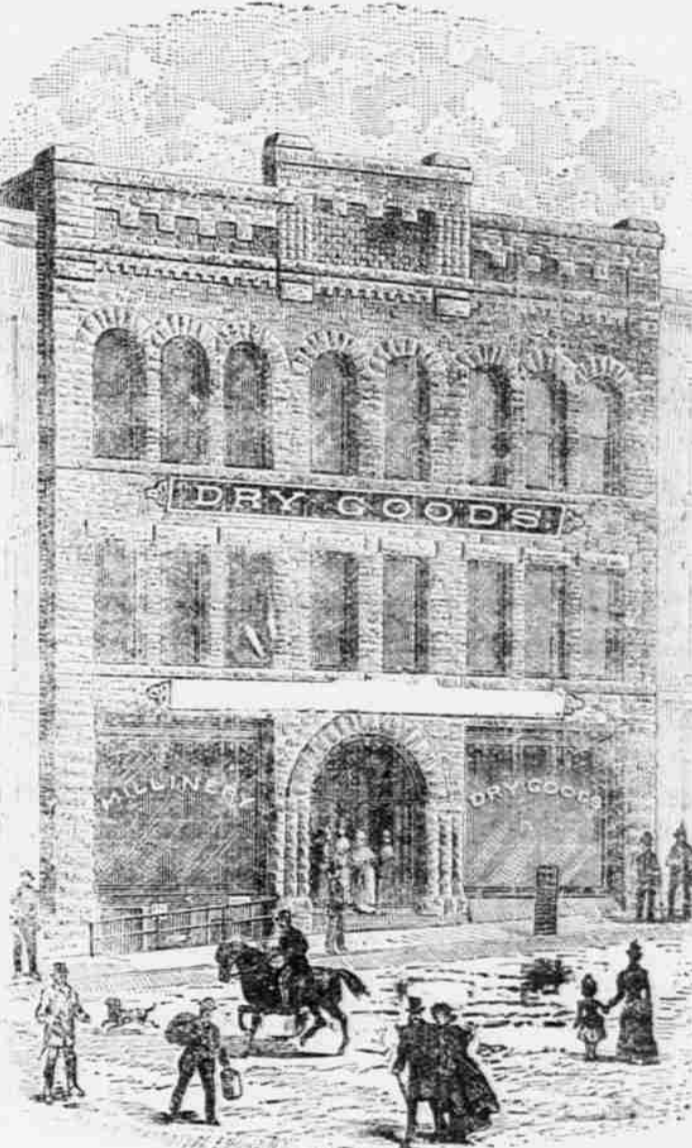
