ADDITIONAL RAILROAD NEWS.

The tenth annual report of the Burlington voluntary relief has just been published, containing a report of the operations of the department for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1898. The report shows a total balance in the treasury up to December 31, 1898, of \$319,283 93, while the known and estimated liabilities up to the same date are \$104,325 48. This leaves an estimated surplus of \$214,958 45. During the year benefits to the amount of \$118,034 84 for sickness and \$139,532 86 for accidents have been paid. The organization increased 1,097 in membership during 1898 and at the close of the year had a total membership of 16,325.

ORDINANCE NO. 82.

An Ordinance to authorize and empower the Mayor and City Council of the City of McCook, Red Willow County, Nebraska, to issue certain bonds of the City and provide for the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds when due.
Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of McCook, Red Willow County, Nebraska: SECTION 1. The Mayor and City Council of the City of McCook, Nebraska, to be known as "Court House Bonds" in the sum of \$1,500, to aid the County of Red Willow, in the State of Nebraska, to construct and furnish a county court house within the corporate limits of the City of McCook.
Said bonds to be dated May 1st, 1899, and bear interest at the rate of 6 per centum from date of issue until paid; the principal and interest to be paid at the financial agency for the State of Nebraska, in the City of New York, to be issued in a series of three bonds of \$500.00 each, with interest coupons attached numbered from 1 to 30, inclusive, signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Clerk, with seal of the City hereto.
SECTION 2. The Mayor and City Council of the City of McCook shall annually, at the time required by law for making estimates for levy of taxes for city purposes, and in addition thereto, levy a tax upon the taxable property, both real and personal, within the corporate limits of the City of McCook, to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay said bonds and the interest thereon when the same becomes due.
SECTION 3. This Ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
