The farmers of Southwestern Nebraska are deeply interested in preserving and increasing all bird life, and it is bad enough to have game killed in season and lawfully, but this killing of valuable birds out of season and illegally is unendurable and should be frowned down by every sportsman worthy the name and by every citizen who believes in upholding the law of the commonwealth.
