THE results of Tuesday's election may be summarized as follows: Ohio—Republican by 50,000; Kentucky—Republican by 7,000; Pennsylvania—Republican by 125,000; Massachusetts—Republican by 65,000; Iowa—Republican by 65,000; South Dakota—Republican by 8,000; New York—Republican by 35,000; New Jersey—Republican by 8,000; Maryland—Democratic by 5,000; Nebraska—Fusion by 15,000.

**Norris' Superb Victory.**

As the returns come in it is being more fully realized that Judge Norris' victory is a most complete and gratifying one. In a district that gives a Fusion plurality of 200 or 300 he comes out with a plurality of about 400. The following vote is practically correct, giving pluralities:
