

McCook, Nebraska, May 25, 1900. Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Henry Crabtree, Stephen Bolles and D. A. Waterman, county commissioners, W. R. Starr, county attorney, and R. A. Green, county clerk. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

It appearing to the board from the petition of Nathan Tubbs and others, and upon examination the board finds that the public good requires it, on motion the following road is established: Commencing at the southwest corner of section two, township four north, range twenty-nine west, thence west on section line one and one-half miles and terminating at southwest corner of southeast quarter of section three, township four, range twenty-nine west of the 6th P. M., and clerk was instructed to notify owners of highways to open said road, and also notify owners of land along the line of proposed road to file claims for damages caused by locating said road on or before the 30th day of July, 1900, or no further reference will be made thereto.

It appearing to the board from the petition of J. W. Kinghorn and others, and upon examination the board finds that the public good requires it, on motion the following road is established: Commencing at the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of section nine, township four north, range twenty-six west of the 6th P.
