Death Claimed Her Last Friday.

Death came rather unexpectedly to Mrs. Austin W. Dutcher of Driftwood on a visit precinct, last Friday afternoon about two o'clock. The deceased had been suffering with typhoid fever, but early part of last week seemed to be better and hopes were had of her recovery. Mid-week, however, other complications arose, paralysis set in, and death ensued on Friday afternoon, without the stricken woman recovering in any measure from in the city, Sunday and Monday. the initial stroke.

Services were held at the home on Sunday forenoon by Rev. L. M. Grigsby of the Methodist church, after which the remains were brought to McCook, where interment was made in Riverview cemetery about two o'clock in the afternoon. Services at the home were numerously attended by neighbors and friends and a number followed the remains to the city and the cemetery, attesting the high esteem in which the deceased was held in that neighborhood.

A Sketch of Mrs. Giles.

The following brief sketch of the life of Mrs. Giles, whose death on Wednesday afternoon of last week up in North Hitchcock county of consumption, appeared in last week's TRIBUNE, is from the pen of Presiding Elder Hardaway of Holdrege:

[ELIZABETH FULTON WELLING was born in Cold Water, Michigan, December 25, 1835. When her mother died she was adopted by her cousin, Mrs. Hannah Ireland, who took her to New York City to live. In a mission chapel in lower New York, where both were teachers, she met Walter H. Giles, then a student at Union Theological Seminary. This acquaintance resulted in marriage, August 17, 1864. The young couple soon sailed for the Orient and located in out Caesarea, Capadocia, as missionaries of the American board. Their son Walter the week, visiting his children near Crete. N. was born in the mission field, March 19, 1866, and the husband died in Constantinople, May 21, 1867, while attend ing the annual meeting of the missionaries. Mrs. Giles continued there in mission work for eleven years, among the Turkish language.
