## THE LIVE STOCK MARKET.

Latest Quotations from South Omaha and Kansas City.

SOUTH OMAHA.

Cattle—There was not a heavy run of cattle, and as packers were all anxious for supplies the market on desirable grades of killers was active and steady to strong all around. It only took a comparatively short time to dispose of practically everything on sale. A fair proportion of the offerings consisted of beef steers, but there were none too many to meet the requirements of the trade. Buyers were all out early and anything at all desirable sold without much trouble at good, strong prices. The cow market continued active and strong on the better grades, and as high as \$3.90 was paid for good stuff. In view of the liberal demand and the light offerings of good stuff everything answering to that description was soon disposed of. Buyers were calling the market at the high point of the season. The medium kinds of cows and heifers, as well as the canners, did not show much change. Bulls, veal calves and stags showing quality all sold well at fully steady prices, but the common kinds were neglected and no more than steady. There was quite a demand from the country for stockers and feeders, and yard traders succeeded in disposing of the bulk of the cattle they had on hand.

Hogs—There was a heavy run of hogs, and, in fact, receipts were the heaviest of the week to date. Other markets were quoted lower and as a result prices at this point took a drop of 3¢. It was an uneven market, so that sales were made all the way from nearly steady to a dime lower. The quality of the offerings as a whole was good. Trading was fairly active at the decline, so that the bulk of the offerings was disposed of in good season. Good weight hogs sold largely from \$6.20 to \$6.40. Medium weights went mostly from \$6.10 to \$6.20, and lightweights from \$6.10 down.

Sheep—There were not as many sheep and lambs on sale as arrived yesterday, and the quality was nothing extra. The market so far as the better grades were concerned was fairly active and just about steady. When it came to the less desirable kinds the market was not as lively, and in some cases sellers thought they were unable to get as good prices as were paid yesterday for the same grades. Feeders continued in light supply and the demand was fully as large, so there is no change in the market to note.

Hogs—Market steady to 5¢ lower; top, \$6.55; bulk of sales, \$6.10@6.45; heavy, \$6.40 @6.55; mixed, \$6.20@6.50; light, \$5.50@6.25; pigs, \$5.10@5.55.

Sheep and Lambs—Market steady; native lambs, \$6.25@6.50; western lambs, \$6.20 @6.40; native wethers, \$5.25@6.00; western wethers, \$5.30@5.50; yearlings, \$4.50@6.00; ewes, \$4.50@6.20; culls and feeders, \$3.00@5.00.

## TO END SCHLEY CONTROVERSY.

House Committee Concurs with the President's Conclusions.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The house committee on naval affairs, by a vote of 7 to 4, today adopted a resolution concurring in the conclusions of President Roosevelt as to terminating the agitation of the Schley controversy and indefinitely postponing all bills and resolutions on the subject. The report of the subcommittee as adopted gives all the various resolutions which have been introduced, and says:  
"Your subcommittee, to whom was referred several bills and resolutions introduced in relation to Rear Admiral Winfield Scott Schley, has had the same under consideration and presents the following report thereon:  
"The unfortunate controversy in connection with the Santiago campaign has attracted wide public attention and has been the subject of four official inquiries and investigations, viz.: By President McKinley, by the United States court of claims, by the navy court of inquiry, asked for by Admiral Schley, and by President Roosevelt on appeal from the finding of the naval court of inquiry.  
"President Roosevelt concluded his finding in the following words: 'In concluding their report the members of the court of inquiry, Admirals Dewey, Benham and Ramsay, united in saying that they recommended that no further action be had in the matter. With this recommendation I most heartily concur. There is no excuse whatever from either side for any further agitation of this unhappy controversy. To keep it alive would merely do damage to the navy and to the country.'  
"Your subcommittee, having in view the interest of the American navy and of all, concurs in the conclusions expressed in the words of President Roosevelt, above quoted.  
"We therefore recommend that further consideration of said bills and resolutions be indefinitely postponed, and that no further action be taken thereon."

Admiral Sustodido de Mello, who headed the revolt of the Brazilian navy in 1893, is dead at Lisbon.

Are Split Over Shot Firers.

DES MOINES, Ia., March 22.—At the close of the conference between the miners and operators of Iowa the operators departed for their respective homes, necessitating adjournment of the joint conference until Monday. While minor details are being adjusted both sides apparently recognize that each discussion on the shot-firing question operates to separate them more widely than ever and that a strike seems probable.
