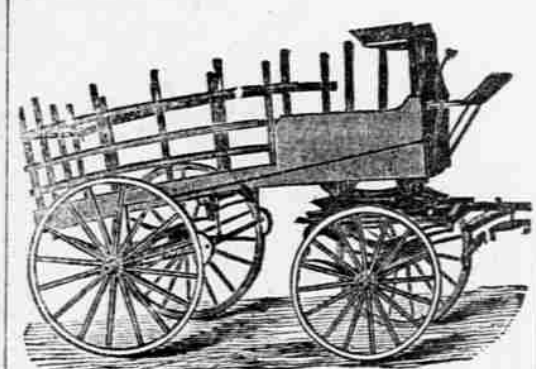

To Prevent Train Collisions.
CHICAGO, April 25.—The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad officials, are testing a new automatic block signal service which will, it is claimed, prevent collisions due to engineers ignoring or mistaking signals. The mechanism is arranged so that whenever an engineer passes into a section that is blocked, an automatic device sets the airbrakes and stops the train.
The device is operated by a battery of springs which are wound up by the vibratory motion of the rails as the engines and trains pass over them. There is no dependence upon electricity, which is treacherous in bad weather.
In a recent test a train was run full speed past a block which was set at "danger." As soon as the engine entered the prohibited station there was a grinding of a shoe against the wheels and the train came to a stop before its length was scarcely within the block station. Those who witnessed the test said that the service would revolutionize signal service and decrease accidents at least 40 per cent.—Kansas City Star, April 25th.
