The Following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as Hereinafter Set Forth In Full, is Submitted to the Electors of the State of Nebraska, to be Voted Upon at the General Election to be

Held, Tuesday, November 4, 1902. A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Section one of Article lifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the nstitution of the said state of Nebrusia. Be it resulved and enacted by the Legislasure

of the State of Nebraska: Section 1. That Section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska Le amended to read as follows: SECTION I.
