PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.
The Following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as Hereinafter Set Forth in Full, is Submitted to the Electors of the State of Nebraska, to be Voted Upon at the General Election to be Held, Tuesday, November 4, 1902.

A Joint Resolution proposing amended Section one of Article fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the constitution of the said state of Nebraska.

Be it resolved and enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

SECTION 1. That Section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

SECTION 2. Either branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the journals with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county, where a newspaper is published, for thirty days immediately preceding the next election of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors for approval or rejection, and if a majority of the electors voting at such election on such proposed amendment, shall vote to adopt such amendment, the same shall become a part of this constitution. When more than one amendment is submitted at the same election, they shall be so submitted as to enable the electors to vote on each amendment separately.

All ballots used at such election at such amendment or amendments shall be written or printed thereon the following: For proposed amendment to the constitution relative to here insert the subject of the amendment, and against proposed amendment to the constitution relative to here insert the subject of the amendment, and the vote of each elector voting on such amendment or amendments shall be designated by the elector by making a cross with a pen or pencil in a circle or square to be placed at the right of the lines the words "For" or "Against," the proposed amendments, as he shall desire to vote thereon, or by indicating his preference on a voting machine which such machine is in use.

I, Geo. W. Marsh, secretary of the state of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and engrossed bill, as passed by the Twenty-seventh session of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, as approved by said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Nebraska, at their election or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday the 4th day of November, A. D. 1902.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Nebraska, at Lincoln this 23rd day of July, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Two, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Thirtieth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
