If news seem scarce remember we have been on the sick list for a few days and had to go on the relief instead of being on duty. Pardon us this time and we'll do the same thing again.

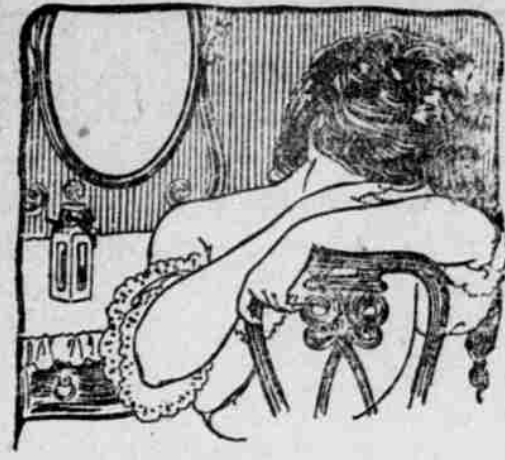
