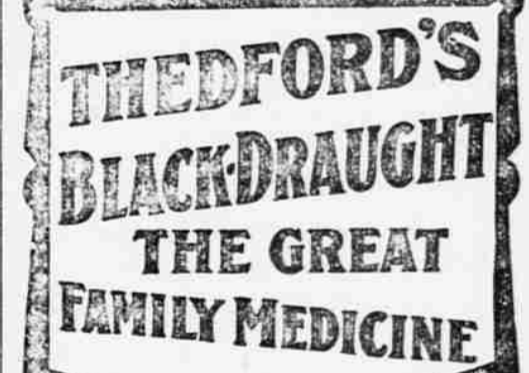
French leave, last Sunday a week, after being on a high old lonesome all day with a few others, and has not been heard from since. Several of the merchants in town are pretty much interested in him at present.
