Besides this Mr. Coe says: "I had 10,000 pounds of beet tops that I found to be one of the best milk and fat producing foods I ever fed except grain." Three things will make this part of Nebraska one of the richest countries in the world, it is dairy cows, alfalfa and sugar-beets.
