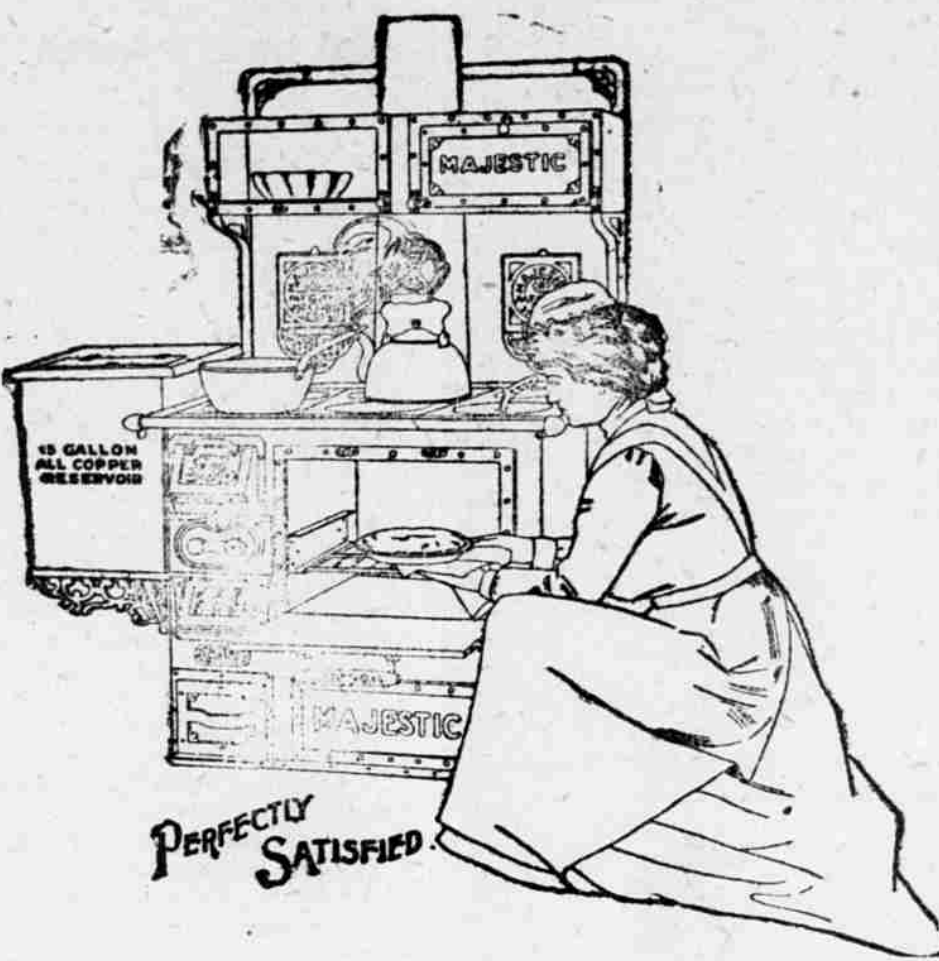

### "Temple Fund" University of Nebraska.

Mr. John D. Rockefeller of New York has offered two-thirds of the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$66,666.67) for a "Social and Religious Building" for the University of Nebraska on the condition that before July 1st, 1904, others pay the remaining third of the said sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$33,333.33) for the same purpose.

We take it for granted that the friends of the university in Nebraska will gladly provide the sum needed to realize Mr. Rockefeller's pledge.

The undersigned, representing various religious communities and the general public are organized as a committee to raise the necessary money.

We appeal to the good people of Nebraska for contributions toward this worthy object.

By the terms of Mr. Rockefeller's offer all the money needed must be subscribed by January 1, 1904, and be paid by July 1, 1904.

It is desirable that small subscriptions should be paid at once in cash, but where necessary, subscriptions may be paid in three or four installments.

The First National Bank of Lincoln is treasurer and depository of the fund. Any sums remitted to it designated for the "Temple Fund," University of Nebraska, will be duly receipted for.

The secretary of the committee will also receive and receipt for any moneys sent to him.

**Talk About a New Line.**  
A clipping from an Omaha paper of recent date says: "The prospect of the construction of a portion of the Rock Island railroad through southern Nebraska and northern Kansas to connect the lines of this state and the main line to Chicago from Council Bluffs with the southern branch of the system are brighter now than for many years. The matter has been suggested to the managers of the railroad many times by the Omaha Commercial club and other business organizations of the state, whose members desire to reach the trade in Kansas, and since the Rock Island has projected its road into Mexico, with a probable southwestern outlet to the Pacific coast, the connection between the northern and southern divisions of the road is still more desirable. Sup't Cable of the southern division in Omaha this week and Secretary Ut of the Commercial club took the matter up with him, showing the advantage which the road would derive through the construction of a comparatively short line which would connect the two systems west of the Missouri river. While nothing definite was said by the superintendent, he gave the club to understand that the matter would be presented to the directors of the company for their consideration."
