A Plucky Show at Best.

The Howe's Great London Shows, which showed here on last Friday, was one of the plunkiest aggregations that ever went down the pike, and will be remembered by the people of this section as well as by the people wherever they have showed, as the most pernicious and persistent gang of sharpers, in a small way, that ever masqueraded under the title of a show. They had about a dozen carloads of property of every sort, not including the item of gall. The police kept after them so closely that the gang were not able to do much business here. From every point where they showed in this section of Nebraska come reports of short changings and other small samples of sharp practice. A few were tricked and robbed of small amounts here, but for the most part the people escaped loss.

Quite Extensive Improvements.

PUBLIC FREE LIBRARY NOTES.

The report of the Library Board, which was presented to the City Council on Monday evening, contains some interesting statistics. The report covers the period from September 10, 1902, the date of the opening, to June 1, 1903. A summary of the financial statement follows:

Received by donation.....\$1,015 04
Spent for books and supplies..... 957 81

Balance.....\$ 60 23

Received for fines.....\$28 24

Spent for sundry minor items..... 27 74

Balance.....\$ 50

The intrinsic worth of the property, is greatly in excess of what the foregoing indicates. Not only have the material contributions, especially in the form of books, been considerable, but the time and labor bestowed in various directions have added vastly to the library's assets, so that a statement of the receipts and disbursements of money conveys but an inadequate conception of the real value.

The library's usefulness may be estimated in another and better way. It now contains 1,318 books, besides 77 volumes of bound magazines and a 24-volume encyclopedia. It receives regularly, by donation and subscription, 20 magazines and six daily and weekly newspapers. In the eight and two-thirds months of its existence ending the first of June, 1903, 12,208 books were loaned, and 29,720 visitors were received. Not even by these figures can the pleasure and profit derived by the people of McCook and vicinity from the establishment of the library be measured. It is free to all citizens of the county, outside of McCook, and many of them avail themselves of its privileges. A movement is on foot to secure a Carnegie library, details of which will be given in the near future.

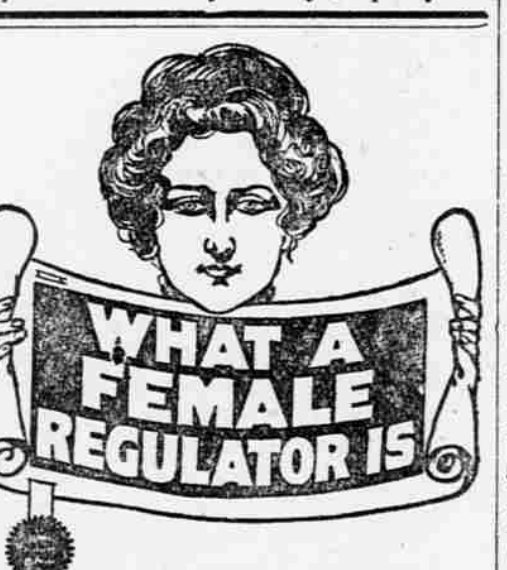
